For our Benefactors and Patrons: We offer two interesting varieties: Syringa vulgaris 'Sarah Sands' a relatively late bloomer,



produces single, wine-purple flowers in spring and was introduced in 1943 by Long Island, New York, breeder Theodore Havemeyer.

Or Syringa x chinensis 'Lilac Sunday' a cultivar from the Arnold Arboretum grown from seed supplied by the Beijing Botanical Garden. The



abundant pale purple flowers are fragrant, appear in mid May.

Spring brings the Bluebirds of Happiness back to Willowwood. In early March, these wonderfully blue songbirds are welcomed back to nest in the blue bird boxes (built by local Eagle Scouts) set in a trail just off the drive. The birds seem joyful as they flit from perch to perch midst the open fields that are their preferred habitat and allow them to feed easily on insects (especially mosquitos) and wild berries. The bluebirds love the open meadows with its scattered trees and bushes and tall grass cover. Bluebirds start to nest by late March

and may have 2-3 broods per season, laying 4—6 light blue eggs. In 2009 there were 19 boxes at WW which produced 18 successful nests and a total of 69 fledged young. Overdevelopment of local farmland and dead tree and woodland clean up has led to the lack of natural nesting sites. And the highly aggressive European Starlings and House Sparrows will often chase away the more timid bluebirds. Only 10-20% survive their first year and will usually return to the same area the next Spring. The MCPC 's Senior Naturalist, Mindy Schmitt, started a data collection project three years ago to monitor and hopefully help increase our bluebird population. Trained volunteers check the boxes and watch over the babies to insure their survival. From a garden's point of view, the bluebirds distribute the seeds from plants for germination and protect plants from insect destruction. The rule is watch these graceful birds enjoy Spring but don't open the boxes! The babies might jump out before they are ready to fly!

New Magnolias were recently added to the Willowwood Collection as part of the recommendations of John Bierne who will be finishing his evaluation of our collection this Spring. These new plantings are young and won't bloom for a couple of years, but we hope the photos will give you a glimpse of what we have to look forward to. There are many other magnolias at WW that will be in full bloom this Spring!



Planted in the Hacklebarney Field are three great new additions:

M. dawsoniana 'Clarke' (DAWSON MAGNOLIA) The 8" flowers are a rich, deep pink. This planting is native to China.

M. 'Pink Royalty' which has large coral pink flowers and
M. 'Roseanne' whose large flowers are a rich lavender pink with soft pink inside.

### Planted in the Rosarie:

M. grandiflora 'Bracken's Brown Beauty' (SOUTHERN MAGNOLIA)

A hardy selection of a southeast native with an upright habit and rust-colored hairs on the undersides of the leaves. The fragrant creamy-white flowers appear in early summer.



Planted in the Monarda Meadow:

. M. sprengeri 'Diva' (SPRENGER MAGNOLIA)

The 8" flowers are rosy pink outside and pale pink inside. Native to central China.

### M. sieboldii 'Colossus' (OYAMA MAGNOLIA)

The nodding, fragrant flowers appear in June and are white with magenta stamens. Native to southern China

Planted in the Alfalfa Field: M. virginiana 'Henry Hicks' (SWEET BAY) Fragrant creamy-white flowers appear in May and June with red fruit in fall. This hardy selection of a southeast native has evergreen foliage in the winter months.
